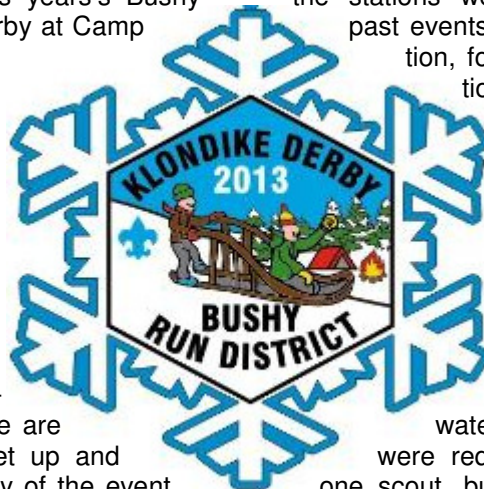

On the weekend of January 11-13, The scouts decided that the stations one hundred and fourteen scouts from the Westmoreland-Fayette Council formed 17 patrols and took on the challenges of this year's Bushy Run Klondike Derby at Camp Tenacharison.

The fun for the Scouts of Troop 251, however, began long before that weekend.

It takes a lot of people to host an event like a Klondike Derby. There are stations to be set up and staffed on the day of the event. There is scheduling to be done, and logistics. There are trophies to be ordered, and coordination with the District. And let's not forget the Camp Staff provided by Bushy Run District and the BB range master from Troop 252. Then there's the luckiest of all, the food judges!

Before all of that occurs, the most important part of the work begins. In keeping with Mr. Peschock's direction of keeping the troop "boy-led", a "Klondike Committee" was formed to plan the activities for the event. Under the leadership of **Justin** and **Austin P.**, the Klondike Committee selected the theme for the event: *Scout Survival*. The idea was to create stations which tested the winter survival skills of the participating units. Each station was designed by one of the patrols in the troop.



would be designed to be a little tougher than usual, and that each station would offer a little "twist" when compared to the stations we've encountered in past events. At the first aid station, for example, the additional twist was that the "victim" had to be transported out of the woods to the station. Fire building required that they burn through not one, but four strings from 12" to 30" high — and then boil a pot of water. Shelter builders were required to shelter not one scout, but their entire patrol. The knot race went beyond the Tenderfoot requirement, and the orienteering station mixed easy controls with a few trickier ones for a total of nine controls. Our most unique station, though, introduced the joys of the bow saw to many scouts who had never used one before. Even the sled race got the "251 treatment", with a new course that required two laps around the activity area.

There is even a hidden 251 element in the patch that the scouts designed to commemorate the event. Look closely, and you will see that there are (2) scouts, (5) trees, and (1) camp.

The last time that Troop 251 hosted a District event, "Mr. P" was our Scoutmaster. With the hosting of this event, we are saying to all of Bushy Run District, "*Troop 251 is back!*"
